

HABEAS CORPUS TRIAL DELAYED UNTIL MONDAY

Owing to the inability of the commonwealth to produce witnesses yesterday morning at nine o'clock before Judge Copeland for the habeas corpus proceedings brought by the attorneys of Mrs. Amelia Boyer and her father P. J. Sammon, the hearing was post-

P. J. Sammon, the hearing was postponed until nine o'clock Monday morning. The commonwealth has a number of witnesses but was unable to get them into court for the hearing yesterday.

On Wednesday night Squire John S. Sloan of Trafford, before whom the information charging the father and daughter with murder was made, held Mrs. Boyer and Sammon for court after several witnesses had testified. Albert Boyer, father of Frank Boyer,

the victim of the shot fired by either his wife or father-in-law, testified before Squire Sloan that before his son died he told him that Sammon was the one who shot him. Constable E. E. Bolam gave as his testimony the story told by the murdered man's wife, who stated that she did the shooting because she was afraid her husband would kill her father during the fight in which they engaged in front of the Boyer home. Other witnesses were present but were not called upon.
